I. Historical Association

This 2 ½-story Italianate structure was built c.1880, at a time when this area of the city was seeing a continued increase in residential use. Much about 102 Beacon Street can be learned from the abutting properties at 9 and 5 Smith Avenue which are of the same style and period.

While further investigation is warranted regarding the past residents and uses of 102 Beacon Street, it is important to note that this structure is nearly identical to 9 and 5 Smith Avenue which was initially laid out

between 1869-1874. This section of Ward 2 was sparsely developed until the mid- to late 1800s when it became an important transportation and manufacturing center. The early industries of the Middlesex Dye and Bleachery Company (1801) along with the American Tube Works (1852) established the development cycle in the area. By the 1870s, all of the brick yards and farmland had been converted to manufacturing and food processing establishments. This uptick in industrialization and the nature of the industries established created significant health and pollution concerns in the surrounding area. Accompanying the industrial growth was the need for workers' housing.



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102 Beacon Street is at the corner of Smith Avenue, a short street near the Cambridge line. This intersecting street runs between Beacon and Line Streets, was laid out between 1869 and 1874. The surrounding land was owned and subsequently developed by Stephen Smith who, from the 1860s, lived on Beacon Street opposite Dimick Street.

Summary: The dwelling is a gable-ended Italianate home built c. 1880 on a brick foundation. The house is clapboard-sided and retains its paired cornice brackets, a door hood over the front entrance, and the one-story bay on the first floor front elevation. Also extant is the original placement of the windows, particularly on the front elevation and on the rear ell. Of further note is the arch-toped window located under the front gable peak. The two-story ell on the left of the structure remains and mirrors the original ells of its neighbors, 9 and 5 Smith Avenue.

Findings on Historical Association

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events

or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (b) are at the end of the next section.

(a) In accordance with the historic information obtained from **Findings on Historical Association**, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, such as *Somerville Past and Present*, Staff find 102 Beacon Street to be <u>importantly associated</u> with one or more historic persons or events, or with the broad architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.

Findings: The subject building is found importantly associated with the broad architectural, cultural, economic and social history of the City due to its association with popular architectural trends within the working-middle classes and the early residential development of this neighborhood area.

II. Historical and Architectural Significance

The findings for historical and/or architectural significance of a historic property address the period, style, method of building construction and association with a reputed architect or builder of the subject property, either by itself of in the context of a group of buildings of structures (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B).

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The period of significance for 102 Beacon Street begins c.1880 and, from the exterior, is nearly identical to the Italianate structures at 9 and 5 Smith Avenue which were built in the 1869-1874 build-out of this small, residential neighborhood area.

Integrity

The National Park Service identifies historic integrity as the ability of a property to convey significance. A property should possess sufficient integrity to convey, represent or contain the values and qualities for which it is judged significant; therefore, the following is an identification and evaluation of these qualities and alterations as they affect the ability of the subject property to convey significance.

- a. <u>Location:</u> The building has not been moved.
- b. <u>Design:</u> The building is an excellent example of an Italianate that retains many of its original features including, but not limited to, window layout, front bay, decorative bracketing, gable ends, 2-story rear ell, front door hood, and arch-topped window under the front gable.
- c. <u>Materials:</u> The dwelling is constructed of wood with clapboard siding and a brick foundation. Chimney stacks were removed during an earlier period. The roof has asphalt shingles and more modern skylights rest on main roof and on the gabled roof of the ell.
- d. <u>Alterations:</u> Many of the windows have been replaced, the original clapboarding has been (either removed or) covered over with what appears to be wide wood clapboard. Three skylights have been added to the right roof elevation. Original roofing material has been changed to asphalt shingles as is typical of most houses of this vintage. The house appears to retain most of its original massing and form.

Evaluation of Integrity: Exterior alterations to the building have been minimal. The retention of the historic form, massing, and building location provide a good example of working-to-middle-class housing in late 19th century Somerville.

Does the subject parcel represent a distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction?

102 Beacon Street, along with 9 and 5 Smith Avenue (around the corner from Beacon), all reflect the Italianate style of dwelling house popular during the latter half of the 19th century. These types of buildings, along with similar wooden structures in the immediate area, reflect the style, design, form and massing of houses that resonated with working and middle-class homeowners of this period.

Does the subject parcel represent an established and familiar visual feature of the neighborhood, community or region due to its singular physical characteristics or landscape?

On the exterior, this building is nearly identical to 9 and 5 Smith Avenue, just around the corner from 102 Beacon. Together, these three buildings form a cluster of nearly identical Italianate dwelling houses. These structures present a cohesive streetscape of working-middle-class Italianate residences that speak to the popular architectural preferences of the

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latter half of the 19th century and reflect the historic residential development pattern of this city neighborhood.

Findings for Historical and Architectural Significance

For a Determination of Significance, the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant (Ordinance 2003-05, Section 2.17.B). Findings for (a) can be found at the end of the previous section.

(b) In accordance with the *Finding on Historical and Architectural Significance*, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, which assess the ability of the property to convey significance, Staff find 102 Beacon Street historically or architecturally significant.

The subject building is found historically and architecturally significant as an excellently-intact representative of 19th century working-to-middle-class housing stock and represents some of the earliest residential development in this neighborhood.

III. Recommendation

Recommendations are based upon an analysis by Historic Preservation Staff of the permit application and the required findings for the Demolition Review Ordinance, which requires archival and historical research, and an assessment of historical and architectural significance, conducted prior to the public meeting for a Determination of Significance. This report may be revised or updated with a new recommendation and/or findings based upon additional information provided to Staff or through further research.

For a Determination of Significance, the structure must be either (A) listed on the National Register or (B) at least 50 years old.

(A) The structure is NOT listed on or within an area listed on the National Register of Historic Places, nor is the structure the subject of a pending application for listing on the National Register.

OR

(B) The structure, circa 1880, is at least 50 years old.

AND

For a Determination of Significance under (B), the subject building must be found either (a) importantly associated with people, events or history or (b) historically or architecturally significant.

(a) In accordance with the *Findings on Historical Association*, which utilizes historic maps/atlases, City reports and directories, and building permit research, and through an examination of resources that document the history of the City, Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission find 102 Beacon Street importantly associated with one or more historic persons or events, or with the broad

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architectural, cultural, political, economic or social history of the City or the Commonwealth.

Findings: The subject building is found importantly associated with the broad architectural, cultural, economic and social history of the City due to its association with popular architectural trends within the working-middle classes and the early residential development of Smith Avenue.

OR

(b) In accordance with the Findings on Historical and Architectural Significance, which addresses period, style, method of building construction, and association with a reputed architect or builder, either by itself or in the context of a group of buildings or structures, as well as integrity, the ability to convey significance, Staff recommend that the Historic Preservation Commission find 102 Beacon Street historically and architecturally significant.

Findings: The subject building is found historically and architecturally significant as an excellently-intact Italianate representative of later 19th century working-to-middle-class housing stock and represents some of the earliest residential development in this neighborhood.
