Quick Map and Directory research reveals that the house was probably constructed between 1870 and 1874. The owner is shown on the maps as Joseph Vello, who according to the Directories worked as a driver for the Union Railroad and then the Charles River Railway. The lot appears to have been carved from the Colonel George A. Meacham Estate that ran from Elm Street to Summer Street. The building's form and massing is in the Italianate style which has been hidden by vinyl siding. It is one of the earliest buildings found on this section of Summer Street which was developed when the Arlington and Lexington Branch of the Boston and Lowell Railroad was completed in 1870. The only Building Permit found was to renovate the bathroom and kitchen in 1995 by B Bailley.
