### NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

The Somerville Historical Society retains its integrity of location, setting, design, materials, workmanship, feeling and association. It is architecturally and historically significant and fulfills Criteria A and C of the National Register of Historic Places at the local level.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

The Somerville Historical Society building, which is the Historical Society museum, is a two-story Federal Revival Style building executed in red brick with a slate roof. The main exhibition hall of the Museum includes Charles Bulfinch's "Flying Double Staircase", which Bulfinch designed and had built in 1792 for Joseph Barrell Mansion (later the McLean Asylum) in east Somerville. This staircase was saved from demolition in 1892 by the Shaw family of Wayland. In the late 1940s the Society acquired the Staircase from the Shaw state and moved it to the Museum. Also, the front steps, doors, and foyer which form the Museum's main entry are from the City's original public library (razed).

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.


The Society was founded in 1897 by Somerville professionals, businessmen, and religious, social, cultural, educational and municipal leaders. Many of these founding members were descendants of original settlers. Included among the founders were Charles Elliot, Somerville City Engineer; William Preble Jones, Somerville Journal Editor; Elmer H. Capen, President of Tufts College; Samuel Walter Foss, poet; Henry Hadley, composer; and John Ayer, founder of the Bay State Historical League. From 1897 to 1908 the Society published "Historic Leaves" a multi volume magazine with essays on Somerville places, names, people, historic sites, etc. The "Leaves" were written by Society members and edited by Sam Walter Foss. Since 1898 the Society has collected evidence and material relating to the history of Somerville and its environs. Also, since 1898 the Society has hosted a lecture series on local, state, and national history.

The building site is the geographic center of the community and was chosen for its central location. The Museum is the only cultural facility constructed by the community since its founding as a town in 1842.
