Legal Notice: Applicant, Sophiya Thakali, and Owner, Broadway Investments Inc., seek a Special Permit for adding seating to a fast food use and for parking relief. NB Zone. Ward 5.

Dates of Public Hearing: Zoning Board of Appeals – October 7, 2015

I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1. Subject Property: The subject property is 5,510 square foot lot with single story commercial building. Current tenants include two restaurants and a tailor.
2. Proposal: One of the current tenants, Tasty Mo Mo, operates a fast-order food establishment out of a 578 gross square foot storefront and seeks a special permit for adding 10 seats (four chairs at one table, and six stools at a counter) in the existing waiting area.

3. Green Building Practices: None listed on the application.

4. Comments:

Ward Alderman: Alderman Neidergang has been contacted and has no comments at this time.

II. FINDINGS FOR SPECIAL PERMIT (SZO §7.11.10.2.a & 9.13):

In order to grant a special permit, the SPGA must make certain findings and determinations as outlined in §5.1.4 of the SZO. This section of the report goes through §5.1.4 in detail.

1. Information Supplied:

The Staff finds that the information provided by the Applicant conforms to the requirements of §5.1.2 of the SZO and allows for a comprehensive analysis of the project with respect to the required Special Permits.

2. Compliance with Standards: *The Applicant must comply "with such criteria or standards as may be set forth in this Ordinance which refer to the granting of the requested special permit."*

Per SZO 9.4. the establishment is currently non-conforming with respect to parking. By adding seating, the total required parking increases from 4.75 to 7.5 spaces per SZO 9.5.9. Per SZO 9.4.1. *changes in use with no change in floor area:* 50% of the 2.75 additional spaces must be provided; as such the proposal requires a special permit for parking relief of 1 space.

In considering a special permit under §9.13. of the SZO, Staff find that the use proposed would not be substantially more detrimental to the neighborhood than the existing use.

3. Consistency with Purposes: *The Applicant has to ensure that the project "is consistent with (1) the general purposes of this Ordinance as set forth in Article 1, and (2) the purposes, provisions, and specific objectives applicable to the requested special permit which may be set forth elsewhere in this Ordinance, such as, but not limited to, those purposes at the beginning of the various Articles."*

The proposal is consistent with the general purposes of the Ordinance as set forth under §1.2, which includes, but is not limited to promoting the health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Somerville; to provide for and maintain the uniquely integrated structure of uses in the City; and to preserve and increase the amenities of the municipality.

The proposal is consistent with the purpose of the district, which is, “To establish and preserve areas for small-scale retail stores, services and offices which are located in close proximity to residential areas and which do not have undesirable impacts on the surrounding neighborhoods.”

In considering a special permit under §9.13 of the SZO the Applicant must be able to demonstrate that granting the requested special permit would not cause detriment to the surrounding neighborhood through any of the criteria as set forth under SZO §9.13, which are as follows:

- 1) increase in traffic volumes;
- 2) increased traffic congestion or queuing of vehicles;
- 3) change in the type(s) of traffic;
- 4) change in traffic patterns and access to the site;
- 5) reduction in on-street parking;
- 6) unsafe conflict of motor vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

The proposal meets the intent of ordinance. Relief from providing one parking space is consistent with other established businesses in the square. Parking relief in the area will not create a situation that would be a nuisance or hazard to pedestrians and adjacent properties, nor would it decrease the traffic carrying capacity of the adjacent streets or significantly compromise the on-street parking available in Magoun Square.

4. Site and Area Compatibility: *The Applicant has to ensure that the project "(i)s designed in a manner that is compatible with the characteristics of the built and unbuilt surrounding area, including land uses."*

The property is located in Magoun Square. There is a mix of restaurants, retail stores, and offices in the Square and a residential neighborhood directly behind the property. Some of the businesses include CVS Pharmacy, Olde Magoun's Saloon, and Daddy Jones. There are little to no impacts to the proposal. Magoun Square has seen renewed interest in the last few years; additional seating in Tasty Mo Mo will provide an amenity to frequenters of Magoun Square.

5. Housing Impact: *Will not create adverse impacts on the stock of existing affordable housing.*

This proposal will have no impact on existing housing.

6. SomerVision Plan: *Complies with the applicable goals, policies and actions of the SomerVision plan, including the following, as appropriate: Preserve and enhance the character of Somerville's neighborhoods, transform key opportunity areas, preserve and expand an integrated, balanced mix of safe, affordable and environmentally sound rental and homeownership units for households of all sizes and types from diverse social and economic groups; and, make Somerville a regional employment center with a mix of diverse and high-quality jobs. The areas in the SomerVision map that are designated as enhance and transform should most significantly contribute towards the SomerVision goals that are outlined in the table below. The areas marked as conserve are not expected to greatly increase the figures in the table since these areas are not intended for large scale change.*

This project complies with the SomerVision plan by allowing a small business owner add seating within an existing use to help sustain 3 local jobs.

III. RECOMMENDATION

Special Permit under §9.13

Based on the materials submitted by the Applicant, the above findings and subject to the following conditions, the Planning Staff recommends **CONDITIONAL APPROVAL** of the requested **SPECIAL PERMIT**.

The recommendation is based upon a technical analysis by Planning Staff of the application material based upon the required findings of the Somerville Zoning Ordinance, and is based only upon information submitted prior to the public hearing. This report may be revised or updated with new recommendations, findings and/or conditions based upon additional information provided to the Planning Staff during the public hearing process.
